


Ministry – Introduction

Ministry – Introduction (continued)

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Biblical Foundations

•2 Timothy 2:24-26

Being strong in Jesus' grace manifests itself in a gracious, patient gentleness that is willing to wait for God to do His part in people's lives.

Dangers from his adversaries (v.23)

Timothy faces people who will wage war with words, overwhelm with vain and empty chatter, distract with foolish and ignorant speculations and engender quarrels. The danger from these kinds of adversaries or counselees comes when we allow their sin to cause us to respond in a wrong way.

•Humbleness in this attitude (v.24a)

When we are faced with overwhelming opposition that may pose suffering and call for sourage, we must view ourselves as God's slave.

- •Characteristics of this approach (v.24b-25a)
 - Not quarrelsome

Is not given to being easily stirred up to fight.

Kind to all

How easy it is in the midst of suffering and opposition to become unkind.

Able to teach

We must teach our flocks, our counselees, our spouses, and out children.

Patient when wronged

It is easy to become exasperated and frustrated with people's hardheartedness and stubbornness.


Gentle correction

With gentleness, like child training and chastening, we correct and chasten.

Expectations in his actions (v.25b-26)

After all Ithat we do with the Word, accurately handled and ably communicated, at the end of the day, true and lasting repentance leading to change is what God and God alone does. And repentance does two very important things:

- Repentance causes them to acknowledge the truth
- Repentance causes them to come to their senses



Mission

To be an instrument of seeing and change in the lives of those struggling with issues of life so as to restore their relationship to God and to one another.

Objectives and Goals

- Believing that people live out how they think and what they want, we focus our counsel on both the outward and the inward, on the behavior and the heart.

- Believing that patterns and themes of sin must be changed and reinforced through godly discipline, we work to implement practical steps of action that make putting off sin and putting on righteousness a reality.

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Agenda and Development Believing that the church is the central place of God's work, we counsel as a ministry of a local church. Our counseling is under the direction of and is a ministry of Clearcreek Chapel. Believing that people need help, we counsel people from other churches or who are not churched who are willing to commit to certain expectations.

What is the Procedure for the Counseling Ministry?

Scheduling

•The person who is in need must call for an appointment.


We have found that we have a better chance of them being ready to listen and change.

•We counsel on Mondays, unless there is an emergency situation.

We average between 800 and 900 counseling appointments per year.

- •Explanation of our requirements for receiving counseling is given
- •A packet is sent to the home, unless there is not enough time before Monday.


If the appointment time does not leave time for mail to be received, then the people are asked to come 1 hour early for their first appointment to complete the paperwork that we require.



The Personal Data Inventory (PDI)


Each person completes the PDI prior to their first appointment.

This first page explains our philosophy of counseling and what we mean by Biblical confidentiality. We cannot promise that what is said during the sessions will never leave the room. Matthew 18 makes it clear that there are times when a person who continues to live in unconfessed, unrepentant sin must be confronted by an increasing circle of other believers, in order to redeem that person from their sinful state and restore to fellowship with Christ and His church.




Page 2 of 7 of the PDI

This page explains that this ministry is done free of charge. However, if they want to make a donation to the ministry, then that is available. These donations are used to help those whose financial condition make it almost impossible to purchase books that are used during counseling.




Page 3 of 7 of the PDI

This begins the personal information part. We ask for information about who you are and about recent health and doctor visits. Sometimes changes in medications can cause things like depression.




Page 4 of 7 of the PDI

Religious background is an important item as well as their current spiritual situation. Asking them about how they perceive themselves is also helpful.




Page 5 of 7 of the PDI

We gather info about their current marriage and any previous marriages. What children are involved, both from previous marriages and the current marriage. We also collect info on their family while they were growing up.



Page 6 of 7 of the PDI

This is a continuation of family history.



The last page of the PDI

This is an important page for this first session. This asks 7 questions about their perception of the current situation. The first three involve what is the problem from your point of view, what have you done about it, and what do you expect me to do about it. In other words, why are you here and what are your expectations.




Our Philosophy of Counseling

We had a large and long waiting list. My observations were that people who did not have a good solid Biblical foundation were taking many appointments. So I put together this philosophy which requires that people coming from other churches must have their pastor, or other leader, accompany them to their sessions. This person has the responsibility to help them during the week when they are struggling, as well as tell me when I am teaching something that is in opposition to what they believe and teach at their church.

There were a couple of reasons for this philosophy and policy. First, I wanted pastors to come so they could see that they were competent to counsel, even though they were taught at Bible college and seminary that they weren't. Second, we are not accountable for their sheep; they are. Third, there needs to be someone there who can give a report to the church of what has been going on when the need to begin church discipline arises. And fourth, I found that when the person's church teaches differently from what I teach in the session, then I'm the one who is doubted. I need to know that at the time I am teaching, not a month later.


This policy reduced our waiting list by 75%, as people found that their leadership was not willing to come, or that they didn't trust anyone at their church with their situation, therefore, wouldn't allow anyone in the sessions.

Third page of the philosophy




Why Biblical Counseling?

We want them to know from the beginning that we are different from all of the couseling they have been exposed to in the past.

What is a Typical Session Like?

- •We ask a lot of questions and try to listen well.
- •We attempt to respond from the Scriptures in an appropriate way according to what is needed.
- •We end with growth and change activities (also known as homework) for them to work on during the week.

This is not the magic hour when everything happens. Becoming more like Christ is a daily task which requires diligent work. It is explained that this is a very important part of this process and laziness is not an option.



Formal Training

Level One

This course is the basic course in Biblical counseling. It will introduce you to the philosophy and practice of Nouthetic Counseling.

Level Two

This course is an advanced course designed to give further in-depth instruction and application of the principles taught in Level One.

Master's Mission

Instruments of Change curriculum


Several of us have been trained in the curriculum put out by CCEF and we are investigating the best delivery system for that training.
